Green Science and Engineering

The Green Science and Engineering emphasizes on environment and sustainability related studies, important for the future of mankind. To foster cross-disciplinary education, faculty members drawn from all other eight divisions will be involved in the teaching. At the same time, the student is expected to associate with a faculty member and join his/her research group to pursue advanced education for thesis research. The thesis research advisor can be chosen from among all faculty members of the graduate program in science and technology.

Linguistics <TESOL>

Program in Linguistics (TESOL) builds on Sophia's traditional strengths in linguistics and foreign language education. It provides graduate courses similar to those in the United States and Canada with emphasis on both theory and practice. The faculty members represent a diverse spectrum of applied linguistics and language education, ensuring a comprehensive program for anyone interested in teaching English as a second or foreign language.

Japanese Language Course

Those who have no knowledge of Japanese should enroll in JPN100 (Basic Japanese) or JPN111 (Japanese 1).

Those who have some prior exposure to Japanese should take the Japanese Placement Test; they will be placed in the appropriate track and class level on the basis of their performance on the test and consultation, if necessary, with the Japanese language faculty. There are two tracks of Japanese courses (regular program and intensive program).

Regular Japanese Course (4 credits)

Japanese Language Regular Program is for a) beginners of Japanese or b) intermediate-advanced level students who do not intend to take the Intensive Program (JLIP). In the Japanese Language Regular Program, 90-minute classes meet four or five times a week. Students take placement test before course registration. English is occasionally used for instruction when necessary.

Intensive Japanese Course (8 credits)

In the JLIP, classes meet for three hours a day (9:15 to 12:30) from Monday through Friday. English is occasionally used for instruction when necessary. There are four levels, and the lowest level is for students who have reached a level N5 in Japanese Language Proficiency Test or equivalent. All students who plan to take JLIP must take a language placement test before course registration, and will be assigned to a level on the basis of the results of the placement test.

*Since the Intensive Japanese is a very demanding course, we usually recommend students to take no more than two courses besides Intensive Japanese.

The service is available only for students who arranged August Pick Up Service housing through Sophia. (Each student will need to pay the public transportation expenses.) All exchange students are required to make arrangements for health insurance by themselves. Japanese Florlical Insurance National Health Insurance is strongly recommended. Students can also obtain a health insurance in their home country that covers medical costs in Japan. a cadent Insurance Personal Accident Insurance for Students Pursuing Education and Research Cost: 800 JPY/year (Mandatory)

College Student visa or other appropriate visa is required.
